

### Message from Dean

FOCUS # The Main Thing

I am sure you have heard the statement "The main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing". It sounds silly right, but far too often our goals, purpose and peace are torpedoed not necessarily by outside circumstance or challenges but simply by our own propensity, corporately or individually, to get sidetracked or become slightly skewed in our focus. If we are truly honest, I am sure we would admit we have experienced this in our own lives and seen it in the lives of others. Organisations, marriages, careers, NGOs, sports clubs and huge corporations fail simply because the focus got lost; the main thing became secondary. Secondary things took priority, finance and time. This does not happen at the beginning of a marriage or an organisation's life-cycle but often when it becomes easy or there have been a few success stories. It was Stephen Covey who made the above saying famous in his book "The seven habits of highly effective people". He must have been on to something because that book sold over 25 million copies. To remember the implementation, I prefer the child's version:

- 1. Be Pro-active
- 2. Begin with the end in mind
- 3. Put first things first (Keep the main thing the main thing)
- 4. Think win-win
- 5. Seek first to understand
- 6. Synergize
- 7. Sharpen the saw

Over the past few weeks, the reflections on a Sunday have been focussed on unpacking what is, for the Church, the main thing. This is the five marks of mission. (Confession: some of these thoughts are from the sermon for the 17th March – 10:30am at PPC). It must continually be stressed and emphasized that all five marks hang together. They are interrelated and they are all vital. Can you remember them? Let me remind you: TELL, TEACH, TEND, TRANSFORM, TREASURE or the order in which they have been covered on Sundays.

FIVE MARKS OF MISSION Mark 5 (TREASURE) - To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

Mark 4 (TRANSFORM) - To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation

Mark 3 (TEND) - To respond to human need by loving service

Mark 2 (TEACH) - To teach, baptise and nurture new believers

Mark 1(TELL) - To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom

Many churches in the Christian faith have mission and vision statements that are based primarily on the words of: the Greatest Commands and the Great Commission. These words the gospel writers attribute to Jesus in his final hours with his disciples, either before or after the cross. These words are repeated in different ways throughout all of the gospels – Jesus in a sense wanted them to "keep the main thing the main thing". The five Marks of mission have been taken from these instructions. I am sure if you have been around church for any length of time you have not only heard them but also heard them being preached several times.

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' 31 The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' [b] There is no commandment greater than these." (Mark 12:30-31)

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

Breaking them down into the five Marks of mission gives us a tangible list to work on. As Lisa shared on 18 February she does not like lists/simplified structure (and I am sure there are many that feel the same). It seems too simplistic (and it is), but perhaps that is the point because it gets us moving from theory to praxis. A clear and simple mission/vision allows us to focus our energy and efforts in order to achieve our goal. There are always many good things that we could be spending our time, energy and resources on and having a clear vision gives us the clarity to say no to certain things. Having a clear vision and mission also keeps us motivated and determined when obstacles come our way. I love the above picture because while it is silly in a lot of ways it is also challenging.

The challenge is if someone is looking at our lives will they know what our main thing is? Are we involved in some way with all of these Marks of Mission to the extent that others can see that we are different.

The Current sermon series on the Five-Marks of mission were intended to remind us and keep us moving forward with purpose during these times of change. It is intended to unify us and focus our energy on what is truly vital and important. The Ministerial Team, emphasised repeatedly that they are integrated and interdependent. The challenge to each individual is to consider how you are or how you can become involved in each one of them. In this way you will be partnering with God and your faith will be stretched and grown in a holistic way.

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# **Easter Pick up your cross**

EASTER # Pick up your cross



In the next few weeks all around the world in different countries and cultures, people will be celebrating in different ways - the sacrificial death and glorious resurrection of Jesus, our Lord and Saviour. In some cultures, denominations and traditions the emphasis will be around Thursday and Friday with vigils and services commemorating the greatest sacrifice of all. In other cultures, denominations and traditions the focus will mostly be kept to an Easter Sunday celebration- resurrection, victory and New Life. Personally, I have found the services and traditions of Thursday and Friday more meaningful and find it hard to fathom how anyone can truly celebrate or experience New Life without walking through Thursday and Friday.

It was inevitable that Jesus would end up on a cross because the path he chose was one that challenged and exposed the ways of those who held the power. When Jesus chose humbly to enter Jerusalem on a donkey all knew it was a challenge to those in authority - Jesus was taking a stand. It was in a real sense a crossroads in His life. When we choose to follow Jesus which is ultimately what it means to be a Christian, we too will come to moments when we have a choice to make: To take a stand, to forgive, to love our enemy, to give and not count the cost, to lay down our lives for a friend, spouse and child. As I mentioned in the sermon on the 10th March the word "follow" comes up 148 times in the New Testament. When Jesus first calls his disciples (apprentices/learners) he calls them to follow and in Luke 5 it mentions that they left their boats and followed (Luke 5:11). Later, Jesus expounds on what it means to follow. "Then he

called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." Mark 8:34. Jesus uses this phrase "take up your cross and follow Me" as a powerful metaphor for discipleship and commitment. Jesus uses it in the context of Peter objecting to the idea that Jesus would suffer and die. Jesus rebuked Peter and then explained what it truly means to follow Him.

In Jesus' time, everyone understood the meaning of the word "cross." Today every second celebrity or rock star is either wearing a piece of jewellery or tattoo in the shape of a cross. That was not the case in Jesus' day because many had seen, heard and even smelled what that meant - it was horrific and to be avoided at all costs. Roman soldiers literally crucified people on crosses, and carrying one's cross meant dragging it (or at least the cross beam) along to the place of execution. Taking up one's cross symbolizes being willing to endure suffering, ridicule, and even death for the sake of following Jesus. Following Jesus means more than mere association; it involves a radical commitment to His teachings and way of life and this will inevitably lead to crossroads. It is about being a disciple, an apprentice of Jesus, wanting to be with him, wanting to be like him, literally doing the things he did. This will inevitably require a surrender of self, a surrender of one's will to that of Jesus. Moments in everyday life when we have a choice to make. It should bring to mind Jesus crying out to the Father in the garden for another way and yet surrendering to the will, the way of the Father. It is fitting therefore that Jesus starts by saying, "Let him deny himself." Our personal agendas and desires need to be surrendered to the will of the Father. Our following Jesus is a wholehearted pursuit of Christ, prioritising Him over self-interest.

I want to encourage you this Easter not to skip
Thursday and Friday but to join us in those services as
we are challenged afresh to sacrifice all of ourselves
and to prioritise God above all else. It is in those
moments of our everyday lives when we choose His
way of Grace, mercy, forgiveness, generosity,
selflessness, kindness, meekness and patience that
we experience the New Life of His kingdom come in us
and through us. That choice will however inevitably
mean a death – a sacrifice, a surrender. This Easter
may be the moment for you to pick up your cross in
the enduring knowledge of the resurrection, the
promise of New Life.


# **Telephone Ministry**

# **United we Stand**

As you all know, the two congregations of Palmerston Place and Gorgie Dalry Stenhouse united on 31st December last to form the new congregation of Gorgie and Palmerston Place Church (GaPP). We thought it would be helpful briefly to review our progress since then, as well as looking at what the future may hold under God's Providence.

### Joint Worship

It has been delightful to see how well our two church families have come together in the joint worship services we have been running since last autumn. People are mixing readily and making new friends, and there has been a real feeling of joyful Christian fellowship on each occasion. This was particularly noticeable when we celebrated our first Communion as a united congregation at Gorgie Church on 18th February.

We will continue holding joint worship on the third Sunday of every month, with the venue alternating between Gorgie and PP. This will include sharing Communion on dates to be confirmed.

All the time we are strengthening the bonds of friendship that have already developed, and we pray that, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, our union will only grow deeper in the coming months. This is important, because we have challenges ahead as we work out how best to serve the communities that God has entrusted to our charge.

### **Future Vision**

The 20:30 Vision Day on 3rd February was fruitful indeed, and many excellent suggestions emerged about how to grow the Kingdom of God in our part of Edinburgh. Work is already underway on distilling these ideas down and identifying priority areas for mission, discipleship, and service. We are anxious that the congregation as a whole continue to be engaged in planning and delivering this, and we hope to be able to report further progress in the near future.

Whether we usually worship at Gorgie or Palmerston Place, it is essential that we work together as one united family of the people of God.

### Kirk Session

The united Kirk Session has met twice since the turn of the year, and is working together very well, though much work remains to be done, and many practical challenges have to be addressed. However, there is goodwill all round and a determination to make GaPP a shining light to our very extensive new parish, serving the community and bringing fresh souls to a saving faith in Christ.

The Kirk Session has almost equal numbers from each of the predecessor congregations, and all office-bearers are joint appointments, ensuring that our future plans will not be dominated by one or the other. We are currently working out the future structure of Kirk Session teams and working groups, and are anxious that non-elders also serve on these. Watch this space!

Meta has been much more than a cleaner, helping to set up halls, answering the phone, taking in parcels, making sure tradesmen get the work done, and providing tea or coffee and a listening ear or helping hand, to those who drop by.

Nothing is too much trouble, and a quick phone call to Meta has often saved the day if something has been forgotten or overlooked.

Our longest-serving Elder retired from active duties in December last year. Having been Ordained in 1959, Jimmy Blackwood has served our congregation for 64 years. He must run on those batteries which last longer than any others!

Initially ordained into the congregation of Tynecastle Church, which through Union with Cairns Memorial became Gorgie Church, which became Gorgie Dalry, which became Gorgie Dalry Stenhouse, before arriving where we are now at Gorgie and Palmerston Place – quite a journey and a few stories to tell.

Jimmy has been an exemplary District Elder, visiting regularly, delivering the church magazine, keeping us informed of any pastoral issues, and now welcoming everyone attending Sunday by Sunday. In addition to all this, he faithfully attended Kirk Session meetings, including one memorable occasion during the pandemic via Zoom, when he looked every inch the professional and online meetings were an every day occurrence for him.

Two people who are wonderful examples of "faithful servants" (Matt.25:21) who have gone beyond what was asked of them, and whose service is not only to the church family but to the Lord Himself, we are fortunate to know them.

### **Saltyard Services**

"Most of us know Saltyard for it's hearty soup and amazing baking. But the vision was always for it to be more than a cafe. At it's core we are trying to build community, so that it becomes a space that regular visitors, and volunteers, increasingly feel is theirs. This is working really well. But where do we go from here? What is the next step?

One possible answer is Cafe Church. And over the last year we have been opening the Saltyard doors at 7pm on a Sunday night. Initially we watched "The Chosen" together, prayed and discussed what we saw. More recently we have been reading the Bible together (working through Ephesians, and now looking at the Lord's prayer). We've experimented with creative ways to pray and to worship. Our hope is that this will feel different from Sunday worship - a space you can bring that friend who might prefer a more informal and interactive style of worship. This might include teens and younger adults, those with disabilities, and anyone who enjoys space to think and be creative. Come along and give it a try.



Part of the cafe church experiment has been to offer a regular Taize service. Usually this is the last Cafe church of the month - but we have moved March back to the 24th (Palm Sunday). Taize is based around simple meditative songs (usually based on a verse of scripture), Bible readings, Prayer, and silence. It is run ecumenically and deliberately provides a contrasting way of worship. If you have never been then I'd encourage you to give it a try.



### **Diadem**

As you will remember, under the terms of the Presbytery Mission Plan, we are obliged to dispose of the suite of buildings known as Diadem by 31st December 2023.

Having shown we were engaged in efforts to sell the premises, an extension to the date was given.

With the help and guidance of the Church of Scotland Law Department and General Trustees, we are now nearing completion of the sale of Diadem to a group who have had use of the building, through letting space there, over a fairly lengthy period. City on a Hill is an independent Christian church worshipping regularly in Diadem and now in a position to offer to purchase it; conversations are currently taking place with the Law Department.

Although disappointed that we will no longer have a presence at the Stenhouse end of our parish, our Kirk Session is pleased that Diadem will remain in the hands of a Christian church. City on a Hill have been gracious in agreeing to discuss the possibility of Gorgie and Palmerston Place Church (GaPP) using space in Diadem in the future.

Although nothing is yet finalised, the sale is likely to be completed soon. Please remember the situation in your prayers.

### **Vacancy Update**

While we are very fortunate to enjoy the preaching and pastoral care of Rev Dean Batchelor, the question frequently being asked just now is, "When are we going to get a new minister?"

We overcame the first hurdle when GDS and PPC became the united congregation of Gorgie and Palmerston Place Church (GaPP) on 31st December 2023.

Presbytery has now appointed a Vacancy Advisory Committee of three people, who will meet with the Kirk Session to guide and support us throughout our period of vacancy. At the moment we are fixing a date for our first meeting with the committee, Rev David Clarkson, Mrs Jean Aldred and Dr John Sharp.

We are in the process of preparing a Parish Profile, which will include input from our 20:30 Vision Day as that information becomes available. (Thanks are due to Rev Douglas Reid for taking on the task of collating all the details shared during that inspiring time together.)

Discussions to determine what we are looking for in our minister, preparing an advertisement, and selecting a Nominating Committee which is representative of our congregation, will be among the next tasks to be undertaken.


Many people are doing all they can to keep the process moving forward and we will keep you up to date as we progress.

### Vacancies:

We are without our cleaner for our Gorgie building. (the Saltyard contract cleaner is covering at present)
We have not had an administrator at Gorgie since the autumn of 2022. (volunteers are filling some of the gaps but others remain)

We have been without our Saltyard Manager since the end of January. (We will be advertising for a temporary Café Assistant from the beginning of March)

We are losing our Church Facilitator from the Palmerston Place office at the end of April.

Once our Mission Plan is agreed following on from our Vision Day, the Kirk Session will decide how we best replace (or not) these positions.

#### Financial Note:

Every one of our staff team members is paid a stipend/salary (with the exception of our OLM)
Our new minister will be paid from Central Church of Scotland funds.

Under the Presbytery Plan we were allocated 0.5 of an MDS post which is our Children and Families Ministerial Assistant role. This is also paid for from Church of Scotland funds. Our Kirk Session agreed that we would fund the other half from our congregational income.

All of the other members of staff listed above and any new appointments also need to be paid for from our congregational income which is mainly our weekly offerings and premises letting.

### **Youth Update**



# **End of Year Newsletter**

Historically during the winter months, a small team of volunteers from GDS would prepare and cook a two course meal and serve some of Edinburgh's homeless at The Hub in Haymarket. Due to resourcing needs, we have been asked by Bethany Christian Trust and Edinburgh City Mission to continue with The Care Van service until the end of this year.

The Care Van in an important source of care and support for people who are homeless and vulnerable in Edinburgh. This service operates 364 days a year, has 45 church teams involved in some capacity, with around 300 volunteers serving on the evening Care Van alone. On average 50-60 people use this service every night during the summer months and around 40 people per night, across the rest of the year, benefit

from the Care Van.

Each night the volunteers load up The Van with delicious homemade soup, tea, coffee and buttered rolls. We have now added biscuits, fresh fruit and crisps at the request of the service users. It is always very busy at Waverley, our first stop, and can be hectic making sure everyone is given a hot drink and snack quickly. Often there are requests for clothes, socks, blankets, coats anything to keep out the cold. We always distribute any donated clothing but sadly many leave empty handed.



We have found that most guests really appreciate chatting to volunteers. Often volunteers can sign post additional support and sometimes this can be the first step for the service users being able to get back on their feet. We are aware of a gentleman who wanted to become an artist and had been attending the Care Van for months - he has recently enrolled in an art college programme!
